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# VILLAGE ENTERS 2022 BUDGET SEASON

Beginning in the late spring, the Village enters one of its most important projects: creating the next fiscal year's annual budget. It takes nearly six months and includes a Budget Workshop and a Budget Hearing.

All budget meetings are open to the public for input. This year's Budget Workshop is scheduled to take place on Tuesday, November 16 at 7:00 p.m. at Village Hall. The Budget Hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, December 7 at 7:15 p.m. at Village Hall.

In preparation for the annual budget, each department takes a critical look at operations and justifies a need for each requested dollar. Staff works together to evaluate everything from office supplies, staffing levels, and the effectiveness of current processes and programs. Each department must consider capital assets, personnel requests, revenue projections, and operating expenses.

Departments begin by evaluating capital asset needs in the late summer. The Village considers capital assets to be items with an...

In 2017, the Village of Lake in the Hills engaged in Strategic Planning to develop a framework that would guide decisions made by the Village's elected officials, executive leaders, and staff. Through the process, the Village established a problem statement to describe the organization's challenges at the time. Then, the Village created a guiding policy to set requirements and act as a filter for decision-making when responding to the problem statement. Both the problem statement and guiding policy developed in 2017 focused on the financial health of the Village.

While financial health is a valuable strategic objective and the challenges faced then are similar to today's, the policy left the growth or removal of programs and initiatives up to individual interpretation. This year, the Village pursued creating a set of strategic goals to sharpen the focus of staff efforts to meet the vision of the Village Board.

To begin, the Village conducted a survey in the spring that asked residents, businesses, employees, and special districts to provide input on goals they would like to see the Village adopt. Survey results were analyzed, and on June 26, 2021, the Village Board met to discuss and define a set of strategic goals and objectives. The Board identified five strategic goals, and two to three objectives were developed for each goal. The 2021 strategic goals and objectives are as follows:

# Goal: Improve development opportunities throughout the Village.

#### Objectives:

- Develop plans identifying development opportunities and detail the feasibility, needs, and challenges of each opportunity.
- Develop visual representations of how the potential development area will appear to give developers a better idea of the Village's plan and help to plan infrastructure needs.

Goal: Provide a wide array of outstanding parks and recreation programs to enhance the quality of life for Village residents.

#### Objectives:

- Review prior year's successful programs and research current industry trends in recreation programs to effectively use existing and planned infrastructure and improve the demand for our programming.
- Update and improve parks infrastructure to make the facilities more comprehensive and attract more regional users.
- Create new partnerships with other parks and recreation organizations to improve the efficiency, effectiveness, and breadth of our programming

Goal: Improve the financial health of all Village funds.

#### Objectives:

- Implement revenue growth without increasing property taxes for the average property owner.
- Review current expenses to ensure the efficiency of spending.

Goal: Improve Police facilities to meet current requirements and anticipated needs for a minimum of the next twenty years.

#### Objectives:

- Define the needs and objectives of the project, including proposals for vacated facilities.
- Develop a financial plan and project timeline to start construction no later than 2025.

# Goal: Improve the business climate for the small business community.

#### Objectives:

- Improve relations with the small business community to support their continued growth.
- Expand support for the small business community beyond the local Chamber of Commerce

Going forward, departments will establish initiatives with specific plans or actions to help achieve each objective. These new areas of focus will serve as supplemental tools to the previously existing strategic plan while work on the key projects established in 2017 is ongoing. ...estimated useful lifespan of one year or more, exceeding specific dollar amounts. These are often "big ticket" items and can include improvements to buildings, playgrounds, vehicles, software, equipment, roadway improvements, and more.

Capital requests are prepared for the upcoming year, as well as planned for over the next five years. Though subject to change, the 2022 budget is expected to include three playground replacements, patrol squad vehicles, Public Works vehicles, and more.

Once capital requests, personnel costs, and revenue projections are reviewed, the departments present their operating budgets to the Village Administrator, Assistant Village Administrator, and Finance Director.

Meetings are held throughout the process to review each departmental budget in line-by-line detail. Adjustments, cuts, notes, and revisions are made until a balanced budget proposal is compiled. It is posted to the Village website for the public to access and distributed to the Village Board for review in advance of the Budget Workshop.

During the Budget Workshop, staff reviews the proposed budget with the Village Board. Both the Board and the public can ask questions, make suggestions, and request changes. Staff then has the next month to finalize any changes that result from the Budget Workshop before the Budget Hearing. The Village Board will then vote whether or not to pass the budget.

Residents are invited to review the proposed budget online when it becomes available in November. The Budget Workshop and Budget Hearing are both public meetings and all are welcome to attend. For more information, visit lith.org or contact our Finance Department at 847-960-7400.

# STORM DRAINAGE SYSTEM

Storm grates direct stormwater from the street into the underground pipe system. Sometimes in the fall, leaves cover grates and cause localized flooding and pedestrian, bicycle, and motor vehicle accidents. Rotting leaves also diminish the life span of the asphalt underneath them, leading to premature repair needs.

In areas that do not have a curb and gutter, the swale in front of your home (the "ditch" that runs across the front of your property) is designed to hold stormwater when it can no longer soak into the ground to maintain a dry roadbed, filter runoff, and reduce pollutants. It is critical that you continue regular swale maintenance to minimize flooding.

#### So, what can you do?

- Check storm drain grates frequently to make sure they are free of leaves and debris.
- Use a rake or pitchfork to clear leaves and debris from grates so that water can drain easily.
- Do not rake leaves into swales as this will cause a blockage for water flow.
- Mow and maintain your swale at an acceptable grass height. Tall grass slows water movement.
- Blow grass clippings back onto grass or landscape areas.
- Keep your driveway culvert open.
- Remove leaves from swales to stop them from flowing downstream, clogging up culverts, and possibly creating flooding issues.
- Do not remove the grate from the storm drain opening. This does not unclog the system and creates a hazard.
- Rake leaves away from storm drains.
- Do not rake or blow leaves from your property into the street.
- Dispose of leaves in a yard waste container or compost bin.

# **SNOW REMOVAL REMINDERS**

Winter is usually a challenge for just about everyone in the Midwest. When the snow begins to fall or icy conditions are present, the Public Works Department is ready to set snow and ice removal operation plans into motion to have the streets cleared and you on your way as quickly and safely as possible.

#### Please remember:

- Children need to stay clear of snowplows.
- When driving, stay back at least 100 feet from moving plows and do not pass moving plows.
- Remind children when building snow forts to remain on private property and not to build on the parkway next to streets, which can be dangerous.
- After a snowfall, clear sidewalks of snow and ice for the safety of pedestrians and children walking to school. Snowcovered sidewalks also impede access for emergency, fire, and home health services.
- Remove items from the parkway that overhang the curb, especially portable basketball hoops.
- When clearing snow from your driveway, shovel snow in the direction of traffic and in the direction of plowing operations onto the parkway.
- Please refrain from blowing or throwing snow into the street.
   This action can create a hazardous condition.
- Do not put snow removed from driveways near fire hydrants, and help keep areas around fire hydrants clear.
- Do not park on the street when snowfall is predicted. After one inch of snow accumulates, parking is prohibited and violators may be ticketed.

The Village crews clear the main streets first to speed response time for emergency vehicles and then move to secondary and residential streets.

If Village equipment has damaged the parkway area in front of your home, report it as soon as possible to Public Works at 847-960-7500. Repairs will be conducted in the spring.



# FLOODWAY AND FLOODPLAIN INFORMATION

Residents may view information and maps that show the designated floodway and floodplain areas within Lake in the Hills, along with elevation certificates dating back to 2000.

Any construction within these areas requires review by our staff prior to the start of any project. Additional permits from other agencies may be required in addition to Village-issued permits. Homeowners within this area may be required to maintain flood insurance on their homes.

# **RECYCLING**

Flood Brothers Disposal, the Village's solid waste services provider, offers electronic waste recycling services to all Lake in the Hills residents at no additional cost. Electronic waste can be placed at the curb on the third week of every other month. Residents must call Flood Brothers at 630-261-0578 to confirm that their items are eligible for recycling and schedule a curbside pickup on their regularly scheduled pickup day. Electronics may be recycled during the following weeks:

- The week of October 18, 2021
- The week of December 20, 2021
- The week of February 21, 2022
- The week of April 18, 2022

# FOOD SCRAP COMPOSTING

Flood Brothers Disposal offers a voluntary food scrap composting program to single-family residences throughout the Village during the yard waste collection season, April 1 through November 30.

Residents who enroll in this program may mix certain food scraps with yard waste by placing fruit and vegetable scraps at the curb in a rigid and lidded container or in a rented Flood Brothers 95-gallon yard waste cart.

Residents may arrange the rental directly through Flood Brothers for an extra \$2.25/month.

The program is available at no additional cost, unless residents choose to rent a Flood Brothers yard waste cart.

# YARD WASTE

Flood Brothers Disposal picks up landscape waste on your normal waste collection day from the first full week in April through the last full week of November. This includes grass, leaves, and branches less than 4" in diameter.

Landscape waste must be contained in either a 30-gallon biodegradable paper bag or a standard 35-gallon metal or plastic garbage container identified as "Yard Waste Only" that weighs less than 60 lbs.

"Yard Waste Only" stickers are available free of charge at Village Hall, 600 Harvest Gate, or the Public Works Facility, 9010 Haligus Road.

Landscape waste, including brush and other branches four inches or less in diameter that are too bulky for placement into paper bags or cans may be securely tied with biodegradable string or twine in bundles not exceeding four feet in length and 60 pounds in weight.

# SHRED DAY

The next shred day will be held on Saturday, October 2 at Village Hall, 600 Harvest Gate, from 9:00 a.m. to noon. Residents may bring two copier paper sized boxes of any paper documents that they would like shredded. AMS Store and Shred will put the documents into 95-gallon totes that will be locked. AMS will take the locked totes back to their facility at 13 Prosper Court to shred the documents. No fees are involved for residents. Learn more at lith.org.

## CITIZEN REPORTING

### **SYSTEM**

The Police Department has made reporting a crime easier and more convenient with a new online reporting system. To report non-emergency crimes, use the secure portal powered by Frontline Public Safety Solutions.

The portal is the same system used for overnight parking, vacation house watch requests, and bicycle registration. The platform has been expanded to include citizen reporting. Information reported using the portal is safely and securely transmitted to the Police Department. The portal is available for use 24 hours per day. Crimes that can be reported online include:

- Lost property, excluding firearms
- Criminal damage to property (under \$300)
- Theft (under \$500)
- Credit card fraud
- Identity theft
- Gas drive-off
- Criminal defacement (under \$300)
- Report for insurance

Officers are ready to assist you and provide exceptional service each day, whether you contact the department online, in-person, or via phone.

# ONLINE TRANSACTION HOLIDAY SHOPPING

## **SAFEZONE**



The Police Department has a designated online transaction safezone that is well-lit in the evenings and monitored 24/7 by cameras.

Community members are invited to use this location in the police station parking lot, located at 1115 Crystal Lake Road, when conducting a purchase, sale, or item exchanges.

The area offers a safe location to complete transactions without providing personal information, such as your home address, to unknown persons. The Police Department recommends that community members call the non-emergency number at 847-658-5676 to give staff the exchange date and time so they will be aware of your transaction.

## **SAFETY TIPS**

Thieves love the holiday season because people tend to be preoccupied and more vulnerable to theft. Minimize risk and protect yourself from pick-pocketing, shoplifting, credit card fraud, and other petty crimes. The Police Department recommends the following holiday shopping safety tips:

- 1. Park in well-lit areas.
- 2. Avoid shopping alone and beware of strangers approaching you for any reason.
- 3. Never leave your personal items unattended.
- 4. Carry minimal cash and use debit and credit cards for purchases.
- 5. Have your keys ready before you get into your vehicle and never leave it running unsecured.
- 6. Ask for store security to walk you to your car if you feel uncomfortable.
- 7. Do not leave purchases, valuables, or anything else in plain view.
- 8. If you make purchases online, ensure that you're using a secure website.
- 9. Be aware of package thieves and have your package sent to a secure location or work if possible.
- 10. Report any suspicious activity.

# **ACTIVE SHOOTER EVENTS (CRASE) TRAINING**

Learn tools that can save your life and the lives of those around you in the Police Department's Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE) program.

This free, two-hour training teaches individuals how to prepare, prevent, and react during an active shooter event or mass attack in a variety of workplace and gathering environments, including religious institutions.
